

Advancing Health Care Equity

Inequities in healthcare delivery mean that many who most need health care cannot access it. To become health care professionals who are also agents for the improvement of health outcomes for all, students need to be well-versed in the sociocultural and historical factors that influence health care and the social, economic, and political systems through which it is delivered.

This Quarter at Aggie Square experience will prepare students to promote social equity and justice in health care, whether as providers, advocates, or policymakers. Students will receive a strong foundation in pressing areas of challenge and change in health care: medical technologies, data analysis, privacy, cultural sensitivity, equity, and access to care. Through courses in Science and Technology Studies and Religious Studies, a community internship, and a public lecture series, students will learn to understand the role of history, social institutions, and power dynamics in shaping our current healthcare system, and begin to consider new solutions. 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Caring for people as a medical professional is a tangible way to contribute to individuals' well-being, but only if those individuals have access to care. The benefits of the last 150 years of medical innovation have not been distributed equitably.

Who should take this experience?
